

### New Directed Health Measure to go into effect May 4<sup>th</sup>

Governor Ricketts will be issuing a separate Directed Health Measures (DHM) for each health district. Panhandle Public Health District's DHM will go into effect May 4<sup>th</sup>. More details will be released in the next few days, but here are some of the highlights.

- Elective **medical and dental** surgeries and procedures (including **vision** appointments) will resume as long as the hospitals maintain a 30% bed availability, 30% ICU bed availability, 30% ventilator availability and at least a two week supply of PPE on hand.
- **Churches** will be allowed to reopen with a modified 6-foot separation rule. Churches will need to ensure six feet of separation between different household units. No passing of any items amongst congregants. This will also allow funerals and weddings with more than the current 10-person limit. An expanded guidance document will be provided soon.
- **Beauty/nail salons, barber shops, massage therapy services, tattoo parlors/studios** will be allowed to reopen with certain restrictions. They will be included in the 10 Person Rule and will remain closed until May 4. Both workers and patrons will be required to wear masks.
- **Restaurants** will be allowed to reopen to dine-in options if all of the following conditions are met. They will be limited to 50% of rated occupancy maximum at a time. They will need to maintain six feet separation between seating of different parties. Maximum of six individuals in a dining party (groups larger than six will need to split into multiple tables). Self-serve buffets and salad bars are prohibited. Restaurant staff must serve food directly to customers or implement buffet orders from the customer table. No customer self-service. Bar seating not permitted. Patrons may only consume alcohol on premise if also consuming a meal. Bars that do not serve food will remain limited to carry-out sales and delivery only.
- **Daycare Facilities** will expand to not more than 15 kids per room/space. All other state provisions, statutes, regulations, including child to staff ratios, still apply.
- **Bars, Gentleman's Clubs, Bottle Clubs, Indoor Movie Theaters, and Indoor Theaters** will remain closed until May 31st but subject to change before that date.

### CARES Act Information

**New Information** – Title I of the CARES Act focuses on, keeping American workers paid and employed. Among other provisions, it provides that during the coronavirus crisis the government will pay the principal and interest on SBA loans, wiping out a significant monthly payment for many small businesses. It also creates some of the most high profile programs under the CARES Act, including the Paycheck Protection Program. Under the PPP any small business that has been in operation since February 15 can get a low-interest, short-term loan to cover losses caused by the quarantines and the coronavirus itself. Another part of the CARES Act is the Economic Injury Disaster Loans. This is a pre-existing program that the SBA runs for small businesses in a disaster zone. These loans are processed

*and distributed by the SBA itself. For businesses seeking EIDL loans due to the coronavirus, the CARES Act has reduced the SBA's application requirements and created an emergency \$10,000 up-front loan. The CARES Act dramatically expands unemployment benefits. While each state sets its own standards and weekly payments, the law increases those payments by \$600 a week per recipient. ## **Legal Aid of Nebraska**

I briefly spoke with Shirley Peng, Disaster Relief Project Manager with Legal Aid of Nebraska. I asked her about a number of issues that some of our citizens could find themselves facing. I spoke to her about issues, such as unemployment, rent and mortgage payments, problems with stimulus payments, and other issues surrounding the COVID-19 crisis. There are a number of issues covered by the website including questions about the “Families First Coronavirus Response Act”. This is the act that extended unemployment benefits specifically in regards to COVID-19. It also grants certain allowances for child care, sick leave and emergency leave. Other issues covered in the website are the CARES Act and questions concerning Rent, Mortgage and Eviction. This includes information about Housing Authorities. ## **Restaurant Guidance**

With the new Directed Health Measure being released that will allow restaurants to begin dine-in options to resume, some guidance has been released by the Nebraska Restaurant Association on best practices. The document covers best practices on food safety, cleaning and sanitizing, employee health and personal hygiene, and social distancing. In addition, the Nebraska Restaurant Association released their own guidance and signage with “The Nebraska Restaurant Promise.” That promise is a two-way agreement between the restaurant and the patron.
